Offices:

"Egypt, Syria and Lebanon have asked the Arab League to establish an Arab propaganda office in Canada, Turkey and Mexico. The requests will be submitted on September 15 to the Arab Propaganda Conference."

Anti-Semitism:

"Regarding the speech made by Dr. Maarouf Dawalibi at the meeting of the second session of the Islamic Congress, Mr. Michel Allah Warde wishes that Dr. Dawalibi had given in his article more details on the martyrdom imposed secretly on Father Thomas and his servant in 1840 by the Jews, so much so that the remains of those two martyrs are still exhibited nowadays at the Latin Church of Bab Touma in Damascus. The library of St. Joan Damascene, at the Greek-Orthodox Patriarchate in Damascus, includes a book translated into Arabic which contains about 1,500 cases of secret murder committed by Jews in the various parts of the world. Among these cases authentically proved, is the case of a child martyred by Jews in Damascus, and belonging to the Abdal Nour family.

The fundamental cause of the non-harmonization of Jews with the rest of the world is that they try to destroy what they have themselves accomplished. The foundation in Palestine of a State based on Jewish religion could be stood for nowadays, particularly that this religion denies the coming of Christ in a State which officially recognizes this coming, and this constitutes a flagrant denial to the Christian and Moslem religions which recognize the coming of Christ on earth. Is it possible that, in this field, the Jews can make deny 1,300 millions of Moslems and Christians?"
