In the course of the conversation, it developed that these soldiers did know his son, but that he had been among the soldiers lost in the sinking of a transport.

The winter was coming, and the original group which had been brought from Rhodes had been added to since then other refugees from various countries. They lacked com-forts. The Jewish soldiers returned to their units, and four companies of these soldiers in a single day raised £2,000 for the help of the refugees.

Some of the soldiers adopted orphans. Others found relatives in the camp. One Jewish unit adopted an old couple among the refugees. Jewish soldiers are looking after that camp.

That there was much fraternization between Fales traternization between Faiss-timan and American Jewish soldiers who were visiting their messes in very large numbers: For many of these American Jews, Mr. Shertok said, it was their first contact with any-thing Palestinian, and it was giving them a new conception of Jewish brotherhood of Jewish brotherhood.
